Adapted cuff

Holding a utensil for ADLs can be difficult for some children. Some children lack the motor control needed for grasping (closing fingers around the tool), lack the coordination for functional use (hand to mouth for feeding or brushing teeth), have motor limitations that prevent holding a tool, resist using hands for function or display tactile defensiveness.

PURPOSE

- Facilitate holding of object
- Discourage throwing of tool
- Encourage independence with ADLs
- Reduce physical demands
